FOAM now has access to a valuable storage shed at Evolution Sails in Matakana Road. A big thank you to Rodney and Nicky who have provided this central space, which makes life significantly easier for our water quality testing volunteers. Power installation was kindly funded by Warkworth Community Shop and this has enabled a accessible location for Restore Rodney East's new incubator funded by Herd Partners. It will be used by groups throughout the rohe to test for E. coli and enterococci from freshwater and saline catchments, respectively. Numerous collaborations have created a beneficial outcome.

Make a difference to freshwater quality



Friends of Awa Matakanakana have collaborated with Tim Jack to transform an overland flow path into a wetland. The reasonably flat site is a tributary to Waikumete Glen Eden River and will enhance fresh water quality downstream to Sandspit and Kawau Bay. Also, it will recreate an important wetland ecosystem.

The planting area is superb - no tough hills to climb and easily accessed. As well as planters, we need people to:

- · Marshal the car parking
- · Sign in volunteers
- · Deliver fruit and water to planters
- · Clean spades after the mahi

Planting equipment

Bring along CLEAN garden gloves and spades. Some will be available.

Sustenance

We will have some supplies but please bring water and snacks.

There will be a sausage sizzle when the mahi is completed, with vegan options available.

Family friendly

Children are welcome and volunteers do not need to stay for the entire event.

Discovering the awa with Wildly Curious tamariki

In a new initiative, Friends of Awa Matakanakana (FOAM) is having fun with tamariki at Wildly Curious learning centre.

Children aged four to 12 are encouraged to learn in nature, explore their surroundings and discover the world through hands-on experiences.
